MEDITATIONS

"And now is not Boaz of our kindred, with whose maidens thou wast? Behold, he winnoweth barley tonight in the threshing floor."

Ruth 3:2

The harvest is past, and as we look into the home of Naomi, we may see how those two widows live from what was gleaned upon the field of Boaz. However, when nothing is added, then every day what they have becomes less. Ruth sees that, and again her thoughts are...how must it be in the future. It is such a blessing for her that she may live with a dear child of the Lord. Notice Naomi's love for Ruth and her ability to instruct her.

Perhaps you may know what that is — a time in your life when every day you may come and glean upon the spiritual field of the Greater Boaz — a time when you may live from the benefits bestowed upon you by this Greater Boaz. Now it is all gone; everything is so empty. Slowly It has become hard and indifferent. You cannot see how it will go in the future. In your darkest moments you may say, "Here is where it will become evident that it was never right in my life." What a blessing when there may be a Naomi in your life.

Notice in the life of Ruth, Naomi does not spend time saying, "Come daughter, remember how good it was upon the field of Boaz." She knows that those fields are empty for her. She lets the full light fall upon the person of Boaz. At the same time, she points out the way where Boaz may be found. She says, "Behold, he winnoweth barley tonight in the threshing floor." That is an elevated part of the field where the wind blows to separate the chaff from the corn.

How precious this was for Ruth when such a way was pointed out. How much richer when, for one who is so despondent, there may be that God-given direction, - no, not unto former times and former experiences but unto the Greater Boaz, Who, at the right hand of His Father, is always interceding for He people.
